Year in Review

SCHOOL SHOUT PROGRAM

In the fall of 2018, Synergy had the opportunity to expand our SHOUT program into local schools. We offered one free session of SHOUT Girls or Boys to schools in Chestermere, Langdon, and S.E. Rocky View. Eight schools accepted and the programs had a huge impact, resulting in very positive feedback from the students, school staff and parents.

VOLUNTEER JOB FAIR

The first annual Chestermere Volunteer Job Fair was held on April 15th. Synergy was instrumental in the success of the event by providing extensive marketing support which dramatically increased awareness in a very short time. Fifteen local organizations attended the Fair to make connections with potential volunteers from the area. Synergy also provided a very timely workshop, **Volunteer Recruitment, Retention and Recognition**, on April 9th, giving members from local organizations very applicable knowledge going into the event.

WORKSHOPS

Synergy hosted youth workshops such as Moving Out & Moving On for youth 16 - 22 and Financial Literacy for youth 13+. These workshops addressed an expressed need for more youth-focused life skill workshops in the community.

YELL

The YELL Youth Council Pretty in Pink campaign was once again very successful. YELL presented their anti-bullying awareness assembly to hundreds of students at Prairie Waters Elementary School, Sarah Thompson Elementary School and Chestermere Rec Center's Out of School Care program. YELL also made hundreds of buttons that were sold at local businesses and schools, raising \$500 for Dare to Care.

COMMUNITY YOUTH SURVEY

The year finished with a very successful Community Youth Survey. We had 834 responses, making the survey a solid representation of the youth voice in Chestermere, Langdon and S.E. Rocky View. YELL will be presenting the results of the survey to the Chestermere City Council, Rocky View County Council and Rocky View School Board in the spring of 2019.



Currently we are concentrating our fund development energies on meeting the following priorities:
